

Celebrate Syttende Mai on Zoom May 16

Nordkap is calling members and friends to a Zoom video conference at 4 p.m. on Sunday, May 16, to celebrate the signing of the Norwegian Constitution--the world's second-oldest written Constitution still in existence today.

Norwegian Constitution Day--a national holiday in Norway--marks the date of May 17, 1814, when the country's constitution was signed at Eidsvoll, Norway. Our lodge normally marks the occasion with a festive celebration at the Swedish Club in Farmington Hills.

But once again, the coronavirus pandemic has changed our plans. Until it's safe to gather again, we will observe the holiday remotely. We've chosen May 16th for the day—that's a Sunday when it's generally easier for people to take time to celebrate.



We invite you to come with your Norwegian flag and beverage of choice for a Happy Hour celebration. **Heather Vingsness** will again be our gracious host.

Norwegian honorary consul to Michigan, **Dennis Flessland** (right), will also be there with an update on notable news in Norway. To join us, use these instructions:


TO JOIN BY COMPUTER at 4 p.m., go to: <https://us04web.zoom.us/j/77869312025>


Nordkap Has Connections to the Constitution

Did you know that Nordkap Lodge has unique connections to the Norwegian Constitution? That's because several of our members are relatives of men who signed the document in Eidsvoll, Norway, in 1814.



One of the original signers was Nicolai Wergeland (9 November 1780 – 25 March 1848), a priest, writer, and politician. His descendants include Nordkap members **Sigrid Radwan**, her son **Ed Radwan**, daughter **Connie Hart**, and grandchildren **Laura Radwan**, **Linda Radwan**, **Christiana (Chrissy) Hart**, **Joseph Hart**, and **Caterina (Catie) Hart**—all residents of Ann Arbor.

Another constitution signer was Gustav Peter Blom (4 July 1785 – 28 October 1869), a Norwegian civil servant, politician, and historian. His great-great-grandson is a Nordkap member also named **Gustav Peter**

Georgia Roed displayed a rosemaling painting she had made in the online rosemaling class offered by the 5th District Sons of Norway. More raves from the gathering!



A Letter from President Erik Duus:

My love affair with “Kringle” goes back 25 years. I was working for Ford Motor Company in the Chicago regional office, which also covered the Racine, WI, market where O&H Danish Bakery makes its famous Kringle. I was introduced to Kringle by one of the managers in the office who would buy a few every time he was in Racine and bring them back to share with the whole office. While I know “love makes the world go ’round,” in a way so does Kringle, because that guy was not very well-liked in the office; in fact, he reminds me of the [manager] Bill Lumbergh character in *Office Space* – passive-aggressively asking people for things and then adding “that would be great.” However, bringing in Kringles for the entire office a few times a year was, indeed, great!

So after witnessing the power of Kringle to make people more likeable, I bought one at Trader Joe’s a few weeks ago to [hopefully] build a bridge with a new neighbor. You see our backyard, across-the-fence neighbor had his ultra-bright floodlight shining across both our yards directly onto our house and into our living room and girls’ bedrooms.

So my wife and I walked around the block with Kringle in hand and rang his doorbell. I reintroduced us – affirmed his Finnish last name (as if one needed to be Nordic to love Kringle!) – and made my plea. I told him that the light was shining directly into our living room, and politely asked if he could re-position it, turn it off earlier, or install a motion sensor.

He wasn’t quite “getting it” and went on to say that he tries to turn it off around 10 p.m. That’s when the following string of words immediately just poured out of my mouth: *“Yes, but my wife and I like to dance naked between 7 and 10 p.m.”*

[SIDEBAR: I didn’t realize that his wife and three children were within earshot of the front door sitting at the dinner table!]

You should have seen the look on his face...he must have thought I was serious, my being Norwegian and all. Yes, it was an awkward encounter, but our mission was successful. That floodlight is now pointed directly down on the ground at a 90-degree angle, and if Kristin and I ever want to dance in the privacy of our own home, we could.

The moral of the story is to “shine the light of Kringle” – and help the college students of Nordkap Lodge at the same time!

Linda was hospitalized in intensive care for a serious infection following an emergency surgical procedure. Further treatment had to be delayed when she tested positive for COVID-19. Linda is due to be transferred to a rehabilitation facility this week. Walt, a Vietnam War veteran, will be entering a long-term care facility for veterans, due to continuing disabilities related to his war experience.

Former Nordkap treasurer **Marge Sorensen** was hospitalized with a broken arm and related injuries after fainting and falling at home. She will continue her recovery in a rehabilitation facility.

Joe Himmel, husband of **Carmen Collins**, had successful surgery in February to reverse the ileostomy he had to treat a previous condition. Joe has recovered well, received his COVID vaccine, and is getting back into what Carmen calls 'regular' living!

Debbie Simms received treatment with ablation along with 3 cardioversions to get her heart into rhythm earlier this year. Cardioversion is a medical procedure that restores a normal heart rhythm in people with certain types of abnormal heartbeats (arrhythmias). She's feeling good currently!

Carol Jehle has been nursing an obstinate infection of the eyelid. One of the treatments her doctor prescribed was applying a warm potato to the area. Very soothing, according to Carol!

There's good news about Nordkap's former Norwegian language teacher, **Adrienne Shepherd**, being treated over the past year for cancer. A new line of treatment resulted in the disappearance of over 20 small cancerous spots she had in her brain at the beginning of January. The plan is to continue on this treatment to keep the brain metastases under control.

Nordkap's recent Norwegian language teacher, **Merete Stenersen-Eelnurme**, had manipulation under anesthesia for her left knee, not recovering as well as her right knee after double knee replacements earlier this year. Merete says her left knee has already caught up with the right knee in flexing. She adds her muscles are very sore, but just need to get stronger--and the physical therapy is working!

Sandra and Tim Miller's son Colin will graduate from the University of Michigan School of Social Work summa cum laude on May 1st. Congratulations, Colin!

Join Nordkap for a Nature Hike at Kensington Metropark on May 1st

Come join Nordkap Lodge members and friends on Saturday, May 1st, at 9 a.m. to hike at Kensington Metropark, a 4,481-acre wonderland at 4570 Huron River Pkwy in Milford.

We will meet at the Nature Center parking lot inside the park. Signs in the park will direct you to the Nature Center or ask at the entrance booths for directions. Park hours are 6 a.m. to 10 p.m.

Various trails can be accessed from the parking lot – up to 7 miles of them. Most are very well-groomed, wandering through varied environments like forests, wetlands, and lakes.

If you like birds, this is a great place to spot them— perhaps even the colony of Blue Herons at the rookery (the breeding colony with a large collection of nests high in the trees along the lake by the Nature Center). Blue Herons should have started returning to their nests by mid- to late March, and hatchlings should start appearing 27-29 days after eggs are laid. Bring your camera and binoculars.

If you like, also bring a snack and a chair, and after hiking we can enjoy being outside for an informal picnic.

Kensington Metropark has a daily entrance fee of \$10 per vehicle. If you have a 2021 Metropark pass, entrance is included in your membership.

Due to Covid-19, social distancing and mask wearing are being encouraged and followed at all Metroparks. Currently, the Nature Center building is closed, however most bathrooms throughout the park are open. Bring your own water, as all drinking fountains are turned off.

Our hike will take place rain or shine – we are Norwegians after all!

The donation was made in honor of Debra's grandparents, **Karl and Agnes Højberg**, recognized among the founding members of the lodge and "in appreciation of the fact that the lodge continues to thrive so many years after its founding" in 1929.

Debra writes that the contribution was made possible by her uncle **Raymond Erlandson**, who sent her the check over Christmas as a way to show his deep appreciation of her grandparents.

Debra writes of her uncle, "Since he is Swedish and his children are Swedish and Norwegian, I believe he would also appreciate the fact that the lodge represents a collaboration of Norwegian- and Swedish-Americans" since the lodge currently rents from the Swedish Club in Farmington Hills.

Debra told Nordkap members about her grandparents just over a year ago in a presentation about a "Viking funeral" staged for her parents.

She told of her grandmother, Agnes Pedersen, who emigrated from Norway, and her grandfather, Karl Højberg, who emigrated from Denmark. She explained that "Agnes and Karl met in Detroit. They married, joined an active Scandinavian community, and helped to establish the Nordkap Lodge."

We join Debra and Raymond in celebrating the lives of Karl and Agnes Højberg and their important roles in Nordkap history. We also express our appreciation for this gift of \$500 and its positive effect on the bottom line for our lodge.

Tubfrim Program Update: Your Used Stamps Are Still Needed

Please keep saving your used stamps for the Tubfrim charity in Norway. Nordkap membership secretary **Carol Jehle** will continue to collect them, once we are able to gather again.

The stamps will be forwarded to the 5th District Sons of Norway, now responsible for relaying our stamps to Tubfrim in Norway. Sons of Norway Headquarters in Minneapolis can no longer handle this duty and has relegated it to its districts. Headquarters has also suspended the \$1,000 prize drawing that has been a part of the program in the past.

Please know that your used stamps from letters and postcards are still needed, as the profits from their sale are used to help handicapped children and youth in Norway and to finance efforts to eradicate tuberculosis. **Just cut or tear the stamps off the envelopes, leaving a slight margin (approx. 1/4 to 1/2 inch) to keep the perforation intact.** Damaged stamps (damaged perforation, edges etc.) are worthless and are to be thrown away.

Important News You Need to Know:

Nordkap has a new vice president!

- Recently returned to the Detroit area after residing in New York City, former Nordkap president **Haley Vingsness** volunteered to fill the lodge's vacant vice president position for the remainder of the year. She assumed the position after approval by the Nordkap Board on April 8. Haley succeeds **Cathy Johnson**, who elected not to continue after serving as vice president in 2020.

New member recruitment goal for Nordkap in 2021:

- Sons of Norway is asking all lodges, regardless of size, to recruit 4% more new members this year than in 2020. For Nordkap Lodge, that means **22 new members in 2021**. We have two new members so far this year.

At the end of the campaign, lodges that meet the recruitment challenge will receive a \$125 award. The recruiting lodge members will receive a certificate and a 2021 Recruiter Pin, shown here, sent directly to them after they recruit their first new member. To get credit for recruiting, have the new member write your name and member number clearly on the enrollment form.
