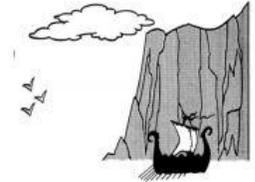

Nordkap Lodge will have much to celebrate at 4 p.m. on Sunday, October 23, at the Swedish Club at 22398 Ruth Street, in Farmington Hills:

- Our newly elected Sons of Norway District 5 President Andy Johnsen will attend our monthly gathering.
- Andy will display District 5's Traveling Viking Chest—literally a treasure chest of special Norwegian art and artifacts, contributed by lodges in our District who have had the chest visit their lodges.
- Andy will share his thoughts about how we can "Be All You Can Be As a Lodge."
- Andy has also promised to bring his accordion and play for us some Scandinavian tunes, as he did at the gala banquet at District 5's convention in Wisconsin in June.
- We will all feast on a special meal prepared by Norway's Honorary Consul to Michigan, Dennis Flessland, who will serve Fårikål (the traditional Norwegian fall meal of lamb and cabbage stew).

NORWEGIAN LANGUAGE CLASSES TO RESUME!

By popular demand, our Norwegian language classes are set to resume in mid-November.

Following her maternity leave and giving birth to beautiful daughter, Clara, teacher Adrienne Shepard has agreed to restart the classes with a special 4-week “refresher” session beginning November 16. The 4-week session would be followed with a regular 8-week term early next year.

The 4-weeks of classes are scheduled for Wednesday nights at the Swedish Club, 22398 Ruth Street in Farmington Hills, from 7 to 8:30 p.m. The dates are November 16, 23, and 30 and December 7.

Because they are designed as a refresher course to bring previous students up to where they left off in April, the classes may also be appropriate for new students who want to learn Norwegian. The total price for the four weeks is \$40 per person. Payment is due the first night of class. To enroll, contact Nordkap President Louise Giles at louiseagiles@gmail.com.

“At \$10 a class, we consider this a good deal,” Louise said.

“Other national groups in this area, such as the Turkish American Society of Michigan, are charging nearly \$20 a class, including course materials, for their special language courses.”

Teacher Adrienne Shepard majored in Norwegian (and music) at St. Olaf College in Minnesota and studied abroad in Oslo. She taught Norwegian to kids ranging in age from 8 to 17 at the Concordia Language Villages summer camp in Minnesota.

Adrienne lived and studied for a year at Nansenskolen folkhoyskole in Lillehammer, Norway. She taught Beginning Norwegian at the University of Washington while earning a Master’s Degree in Scandinavian Studies, specializing in Norwegian involvement in peace and conflict resolution. She added a Master’s Degree in elementary education and has taught Spanish to kindergarten and first grade at Holly Academy in Michigan.

LEIF ERIKSON DAY 2016 PROCLAIMED BY THE PRESIDENT

As authorized by the U. S. Congress in 1964, the President of the United States issued his annual proclamation of October 9 as "Leif Erikson Day."

Here are excerpts of this year's proclamation by President Obama, in which he called upon all Americans to honor our rich Nordic-American heritage:

"More than 1,000 years ago, an intrepid Scandinavian explorer, Leif Erikson, embarked on a voyage that landed him on the North American coast. A son of Iceland and grandson of Norway, Erikson and his crew are believed to be the first Europeans to reach the shores of our continent, founding the Vinland settlement in modern-day Canada. Today, we recall Leif Erikson's historic journey as we seek to carry forward the bold spirit of exploration that has inspired Nordic Americans for generations.



"Eight centuries after Leif Erikson's trip, six families of Norwegians boarded a ship called Restauration bound for New York City. Following in Erikson's footsteps, these individuals sought the promise of freedom and opportunity America offered and became the first group of organized American immigrants from Norway. Millions of Americans proudly trace their ancestry to Nordic countries, raised by parents and grandparents who crossed oceans to carve out new lives for their families and help steer the course of our country. The

United States and our Nordic partners are united by ties of family and friendship, history and heritage. Earlier this year, I was proud to welcome Nordic leaders to the White House. This visit illustrated many of the values and interests we share -- including increasing opportunity for all and recognizing the inherent dignity of every human being.

"On Leif Erikson Day, as we express our appreciation for the myriad contributions of Nordic Americans, let us remember the discovery that set this profound history in motion."

NORDKAP CONTRIBUTES TO FOUNDATION DRIVE TO RAISE \$50,000

The Sons of Norway Foundation, which supports Norwegian culture and heritage through its extensive program of grants and scholarships, is celebrating its 50th anniversary.

As part of the celebration, the Foundation is asking Sons of Norway lodges collectively to help raise \$50,000. A generous matching gift of \$50,000 means that each lodge's gift is doubled. When the goal is reached, each Sons of Norway district will receive a \$1,000 grant to use for Foundation-related purposes.

Nordkap Lodge is joining this effort with its gift of \$50—which will double to \$100—helping to ensure that the Foundation can support more camp and college scholarships, and more educational and cultural programming.

Nordkap, itself, has been a beneficiary of Foundation grants. Most recently we received a matching grant to help us purchase a computer for use in our Norwegian language studies. In 2004, we were the recipient of a generous grant to help fund our lodge's 75th anniversary celebration.

NORWAY'S 'THE KING'S CHOICE' TO VIE FOR FOREIGN-LANGUAGE OSCAR NOMINATION

And the Oscar goes to..... could it be Norway?

Yes, it could, because the historical drama, "The King's Choice," is set to represent Norway in the race for foreign-language-film Oscar nominations at the 89th Academy Awards on February 26, 2017.

"The King's Choice" is set during the German invasion of Norway in 1940. It stars Danish actor Jesper Christensen as King Haakon VII, who refused to surrender to the Germans at all costs.

In her story carried in *Variety*, Elsa Keslassy offered this quote from a leading figure in the Norwegian film scene: "'The King's Choice' tells of a dramatic event for us as a nation, but also examines a part of history that affected large parts of the world. With its engaging themes and strong cinematic qualities, I am sure we have a great candidate in the race," said Sindre Guldvog, who chairs the Oscar committee and heads the Norwegian Film Institute.

Written by Norwegian writers Jan Trygve Røyneland and Harald Rosenløw Eeg, the film is directed by Erik Poppe. Prior to "The King's Choice," Poppe directed the English-language drama "A Thousand Times Goodnight" with Juliette Binoche and Nikolaj Coster-Waldau.
